MEETING NOTES

Welcome and introductions

Partner updates

- San Juan Headwaters Forest Health Partnership
 - o Field tour tomorrow at a property near Chimney Rock
 - Private lands forest restoration project by the NRCS
 - This project is unique for the property owner's willingness to greatly reduce basal area.
 - Open to the public, including Four Rivers.
 - A tour brief will be made available after the tour.
- Phoenix Recycling
 - Visited the Beaver Meadows salvage operation to brainstorm ideas for managing the biomass left over from this project.

• What would it take to get enough equipment up there to manage the biomass in an economical way?

• La Plata County

- The updated community wildfire protection plan (CWPP) has been signed and approved.
 - The <u>CWPP</u> can be found on the Colorado State Forest Service (CSFS) website.
 - There will be a meeting on November 30th to review accomplishments and determine how to complete goals and strategies that have not been met this year.
- Colorado Strategic Wildfire Action Program (COSWAP)
 - Completed wildfire mitigation in the Songbird HOA lands, the Timberline HOA lands and the Ute Pass HOA lands.
 - There are 20 piles in Ute Pass to be burned this winter.
 - Work just began at Edgemont with ~ 30 acres completed so far, and ~ 100 acres to go (to be completed in the next two years).
- State Wildland Inmate Fire Team (SWIFT)
 - Funded through the COSWAP grant to do roadside fire mitigation.
 - Working in the Rafter J subdivision this week. If they finish at Rafter J, they will move to the Buck Highway (also depending on weather).
 - Completed roadside mitigation on County Roads 213, 310, 218, 115 and 117.
- San Juan National Forest (SJNF)
 - o Junction-Falls Creek Integrated Resource Management EA (J-FIRM)
 - Will send the scoping document out for review by the end of November.
 - o Durango-Northwest Recreation Plan
 - Nick Glidden, the District Ranger, is doing tribal consultations this week.
 - Prescribed burning
 - Broadcast burning
 - 1,000 acres burned in the southern HDs
 - 800 acres burned in Beaver Meadows
 - The SJNF is done with broadcast burning for the fall
 - Prepping units for spring burns in the HDs and Vallecito-Piedra area
 - The SJNF will be burning piles from now on.
- Bureau of Land Management (BLM)
 - Prescribed burning
 - Done with broadcast burning on the west side
 - Piles to be burned in Edgemont and Grandview
 - Completed the Grassy Mountain GNA
- Timber Age Systems
 - o Installing full insulated panels
 - Built a library for the Battle Rock Charter School, and completed the installation in one weekend
 - Building a house to send to New York
 - Passive House certified
 - Three Springs pilot home
 - This will be the largest insulated structure that Timber Age has built
 - 3 beds, 2.5 baths
 - Timber Age can give a presentation to Four Rivers in the future about their projects
- Table to Farm Compost
 - o Picking up wood chips from the Pine River project

- Small scale, but every little bit counts
- Falls Creek Ranch
 - Ongoing project with FireSmart
 - 20 acres of ponderosa, juniper and oak clearing on the eastern part of the ranch
 - Very steep terrain
 - Separating the crowns horizontally and vertically
- San Juan Citizens Alliance
 - o Hosted a stream restoration workshop in September
 - The presentation is available online
 - Low-tech process-based restoration (LTPBR) isn't just beaver dam analogues.
 - Featured a presentation about a private lands project where restoration byproducts were used for LTPBR.
- Forest Health Council
 - o 2023 annual report
 - The Forest Health Council has an upcoming meeting in Salida and will visit the Poncha Pass project and learn about Envision Chaffee County.
 - o Clyde Church, La Plata County Commissioner, serves on the Forest Health Council.

CFLRP priority landscape update

- The projects flowchart
 - o Local collaboratives identify priorities and specific landscapes for work.
 - Then, the local collaborative determines the alignment with the desired future conditions and project goals using the priority evaluation tool and create priority CFLRP polygons and target DFCs within the polygons.
 - We are here
 - Local collaboratives work with SJNF staff to identify projects and activities that can be completed in the upcoming year.
 - Based on the priority polygons, the SJNF begins planning for areas that don't have NEPA.
 - The Projects and Places Committee evaluates the recommendations from the collaboratives and then passes those recommendations along to the Coordinating Council.
 - The SJNF takes those recommendations and integrates them into the work plan.
 Implementation begins.
 - The Science and Monitoring Committee evaluates treatments and provides feedback for future management. The Forest Byproducts Committee evaluates treatment and provides feedback for future projects.
- Each collaborative generated a list of priority areas and compiled information about the projects and values in each of those areas.

Priority landscape refinement (BLOBs)

- Broad landscape opportunity boundary (BLOB)
- Merge the Junction Creek and Durango Northwest polygons
- These BLOBs will inform what we are doing and where we are going.
 - o Prioritizing areas where the deliverables and accomplishments of the CFLRP might occur.
 - o To maintain funding, we have to be meeting objectives across the whole landscape.

- o Treatments that meet our DFCs are really what we are going to take credit for.
- Collaboratives should be empowered by their BLOBs and what is important about their BLOBs.
 - This level of collaborative planning doesn't happen everywhere!
- We want a pipeline of work for the whole 10 years of the CFLRP.
- Are we as concerned about where funding is coming from as we are about just getting the work done, regardless of where the money comes from?
 - o Who's job is it to worry about this? The collaborative or Projects and Places or the SJNF?
 - o How do you prioritize one BLOB over the other?
 - If you just look at the BLOBs that fit into the CFLRP's goals and objectives, there will probably be one or two that stands out over the others.
- Next steps:
 - o Identify priority areas within the BLOBs Julia and Anthony
 - o Throw darts at a map
 - Can this be done virtually?
 - Generate symbology on maps
